

Quarterly Consultation Report

1. Purpose of the Report

- 1.1 Both the Force and Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) have a clear duty to consult with local communities as set out in several pieces of legislation. Duties which were previously placed upon Police Authorities have been transferred to the PCC. The Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act expands upon these duties, stating that the PCC has a duty to make arrangements for obtaining:
 - the views of victims of crime in that area about matters concerning the policing of the area
 - before a police and crime plan is issued, the views of the people in that police area, and the views of the victims of crime in that area, on that plan
 - the views of the people in that police area, and the relevant ratepayers' representatives, on the proposals of the police and crime commissioner for expenditure in that financial year
- 1.2 In addition the Act places a duty on the Chief Constable to make arrangements for:
 - obtaining the views of persons within each neighbourhood in the relevant police area about crime and disorder in that neighbourhood
 - providing persons within each neighbourhood in the relevant police area with information about policing in that neighbourhood
 - the holding in each neighbourhood of regular police and community ward meetings
- 1.3 This report details the results on consultation undertaken by the PCC and Force since the PCC took office in November 2012.

2. Executive Summary

- 2.1 Neighbourhood Policing teams hold public meetings in all of Cleveland's 82 wards to assist in setting neighbourhood priorities. By far the most common issue raised is antisocial behaviour, predominantly in the form of underage drinking and groups congregating, especially around shops and in open areas such as parks. Drugs are also a concern across all four policing Districts.
- 2.2 Off road motorbikes are mentioned as a particular issue in Redcar and Cleveland, and theft is a particular concern across Stockton, both through shoplifting and metal theft. Other commonly raised issues are criminal damage and vehicle offences, namely problem parking, usually around schools, and speeding.
- 2.3 More strategic issues tended to be raised with the PCC at meetings he attended, with the main area of focus being concern around the stability of neighbourhood policing resources in the current financial climate.
- 2.4 Other top concerns were the cost of Operation Sacristy, with most residents being unaware that the Home Office were funding the operation, future financial plans and the implementation of the new 101 non emergency number.
- 2.5 The recently launched Restorative Practice initiative was generally supported across communities, with most residents recognising the benefits of not criminalising young people.
- 2.6 Dog on guide dog attacks and the Force's approach to disability hate crime was a particular concern for the disabled community in Stockton.
- 2.7 Public confidence in policing, as measured through the Local Public Confidence Survey, rose slightly on the previous year to 87%, although perceptions of visible policing fell by 3.2 percentage points to 58.9% during the same time period. Confidence had risen regarding the reliability of the police and their ability to understand and deal with local issues, however people were slightly less likely to feel that the police treated people fairly and with respect.
- 2.8 The latest Crime Survey for England and Wales shows a drop in all confidence measures on the previous year, although for the majority of measures Cleveland still remains above the Most Similar Force average. The only exception to this is around reliability where Cleveland now rates second bottom in its MSF group.
- Victim satisfaction as measured through Victim Satisfaction Surveys has fallen for all measures, with Cleveland rating below the MSF average for all areas. Victims of vehicle crime are most likely to feel satisfied with the whole experience, and particularly with ease of contact and treatment, whilst burglary victims are most likely to feel satisfied with the actions taken. Victims of racist incidents are generally the least satisfied with all aspects, with the exception of follow up where they are the most satisfied. This perhaps relates to the enhanced follow up that victims of this crime type receive from Minority Liaison Officers

3 Overall Consultation Results

3.1 Neighbourhood Ward Priorities

Neighbourhood Policing Teams hold a series of regular meetings with their local communities. These range from structured meetings such as Community Councils, which may also involve other partner agencies, to more informal drop ins and ward surgeries.

- 3.2 Each Neighbourhood Policing Team establishes a set of up to three local ward priorities, which are reviewed and updated regularly. Under the original Neighbourhood Policing structure these priorities were to be established solely based on public consultation through ward meetings, but due to low attendance at meetings in many areas, the priorities now reflect both the opinions of the public and officer knowledge of the local area.
- 3.3 Details of the current ward priorities for all 82 Cleveland wards are at Appendix 1. By far the most common issue raised is anti-social behaviour, predominantly in the form of underage drinking and groups congregating, especially around shops and in open areas such as parks. Drugs are also raised as a concern across all four policing Districts.
- 3.4 Off road motorbikes are mentioned as a particular issue in Redcar and Cleveland, and theft is a particular concern across Stockton, both through shoplifting and metal theft.
- 3.5 Other commonly raised issues are criminal damage and vehicle offences, namely problem parking, usually around schools, and speeding.
- 3.6 The priorities generally focus on anti-social behaviour and low level criminal offences. More serious offences mentioned are prostitution in Middlesbrough and Stockton and burglary across all areas except Redcar and Cleveland.

3.7 Your Force Your Voice

The PCC has made a commitment to visit neighbourhood meetings in all 82 wards areas across Cleveland over the course of 2013, in an initiative entitled 'Your Force Your Voice'. To date he has visited 30 areas – Hartlepool (5), Middlesbrough (5), Redcar and Cleveland (14), Stockton (6). Details of the issues raised at each meeting attended are at Appendix 2

3.8 Both Middlesbrough and Redcar and Cleveland have structured multi agency community meetings at a ward level which the PCC has attended – Community Councils and Neighbourhood Action Partnerships respectively. Hartlepool have two Neighbourhood Forums covering North and South Hartlepool, so these have been attended, together with more localised resident meetings at a ward level. In Stockton there is no formal meeting structure so attendance has been purely at community resident meetings, and also the Stockton Disability Advisory group.

- 3.9 The PCC also plans to visit selected schools and colleges as part of 'Your Force Your Voice' to engage with young people, and has commenced these visits at Freebrough Academy in Brotton, Redcar and Cleveland.
- 3.10 Issues raised as the 'Your Force Your Voice' meetings are split between localised issues, as highlighted through the Neighbourhood Policing Meetings, and more strategic issues which the community have wished to raise with the PCC.
- 3.11 The most commonly raised strategic issue was concern around Neighbourhood Policing numbers, with many communities fearing they would lose neighbourhood resources due to the financial cuts being imposed on the police by central government. There was also a feeling that neighbourhood officers were being increasingly abstracted from their wards, and that officers did not remain in post for long enough periods. All of these concerns should be alleviated through the Force restructure as part of Project Orbis.
- 3.12 Another commonly raised issues was the cost of Operation Sacristy, with many residents not being aware that the operation costs are being paid by the Home Office, so not impacting on local police budgets. Future financing in general was also a key public concern.
- 3.13 There were several questions around the implementation of the new 101 non emergency number, and on Control Room functions in general. There has been some negative national press regarding 101 but within Cleveland the implementation has gone smoothly, with a steady take up of the 101 number which now accounts for 42% of our non emergency contact.
- 3.14 The recently introduced Restorative Practice was discussed at several meetings, and was in general very well received, with one notable exception in Dormanstown, Redcar and Cleveland where concerns were raised that this was providing offenders with an easy option. In general however, communities were very much in favour of the initiative and recognised the benefits of not criminalising young people.
- 3.15 In the ward around Police Headquarters, Ladgate Lane there were several questions raised regarding the proposed move of Headquarters to a new site on Hemlington Grange. Once residents appreciated that this move, if authorised, would be cost neutral they were in support of the idea, in particular the potential for new employment opportunities.
- 3.16 The community issues raised varied greatly, covering speeding and other motoring offences, anti-social behaviour, including youth nuisance and problem tenants, shoplifting, and the amount of police resources used to combat it, environmental issues such as fly tipping and dog fouling, and nuisance horses in Hartlepool and Redcar and Cleveland. In general the community issues raised were already neighbourhood policing priorities, or failing this the police were aware and were undertaking actions to resolve.
- 3.17 The disabled community who attended the Stockton Disability Advisory Group raised concerns around dog on guide dog attacks and disability hate crime.

3.18 Young people from Freebrough Academy were concerned with the PCC's plans to engage with the youth population and future budgetary plans.

3.19 <u>Local Public Confidence Survey</u>

The Local Public Confidence Survey (LPCS) is a joint PCC and Force survey which is conducted via telephone interview by a third party independent market research company. The aim of the survey is to measure public confidence and to understand the factors associated with it.

- 3.20 A total of 2400 interviews are conducted each year on a rolling basis, providing a statistically significant and representative baseline sample from each of the four policing districts.
- 3.21 During 2012/2013 public confidence, as measured through LPCS rose 0.9 percentage points to 87%. However, the percentage of people who felt that the local police did a good or excellent job fell by 1.2 percentage points to 69.3%, and perceptions of visible patrol fell further, by 3.2 percentage points to 58.9%. The percentage of people who felt that the police dealt with local concerns effectively remained roughly static at 75.8% (up 0.2 percentage points on last year).
- 3.22 Respondents were asked how they felt about varying aspects of police service. Confidence had risen regarding the reliability of the police and their ability to understand and deal with local issues, however people were slightly less likely to feel that the police treated people fairly and with respect. Quality of life had fallen slightly on the previous year, but perceptions of antisocial behaviour, drunk and rowdy behavior and drug using and dealing had all fallen.
- 3.23 The table below shows further details of the results of LPCS:

3.24 Crime Survey for England and Wales

The Crime Survey for England and Wales (previously known as the British Crime Survey) is a national face to face survey which asks people about crimes they have experienced in the last 12 months, their perception of crime, their quality of life and the services delivered by the Criminal Justice System. Results are available at Force level only.

- 3.25 The survey collects information about:
 - the victims of crime
 - the circumstances in which incidents occur
 - the behaviour of offenders in committing crimes
- 3.26 The survey is also an important source of information about other topics, such as people's perceptions of anti-social behaviour and attitudes towards the criminal justice system, including the police and the courts. It also looks at people's attitudes to crime, such as how much they fear crime and what measures they take to avoid it.
- 3.27 CSEW interviews are conducted on a rolling 12 months basis, with the latest results available dating back to September 2012.
- 3.28 Many of the questions asked in LPCS are the same as those asked in CSEW. All of the results obtained through CSEW are lower than those obtained through LPCS, however as the methodologies used differ direct comparisons cannot be made.
- 3.29 Public confidence in policing, as measured through CSEW, remains high at 71.8%, placing Cleveland second highest in its Most Similar Force group, however confidence has fallen by 3.8 percentage points on the previous year. All of the confidence measures rated through CSEW have fallen on the previous year, with respondents less likely to feel the police are doing a good or excellent job and less likely to feel they are dealing effectively with local concerns. For the majority of measures Cleveland remains above the MSF average, with the exception of the measure around reliability where Cleveland now rates second bottom in its MSF group, with a fall of 2.4 percentage points on the previous year.

3.31 Victim Satisfaction Surveys

Victim Satisfaction Surveys are carried out by every Force as part of the Home Office performance requirements. The surveys are conducted via telephone interview, with a mandatory framework of core questions, covering:

- Satisfaction with the whole experience, i.e. the overall service provided
- Satisfaction with:
 - First contact making contact with the police
 - Action taken by the police
 - Follow-up being kept informed of progress
 - Treatment by staff
- 3.32 The surveys are conducted by a third party independent market research company, and cover victims of five specific crime types domestic burglary, vehicle crime, violent crime, racist incidents and road traffic collisions.
- 3.33 The most recent data available through iQuanta, which allows comparison between Cleveland's Most Similar Forces (MSF) covers interviews in the 12 months leading up to December 2012.
- 3.34 For all measures there has been a drop in satisfaction from the previous year, and for all measures Cleveland is below the MSF average, ranking 6 out of 7 for the majority of measures.
- 3.35 Victims of vehicle crime are most likely to feel satisfied with the whole experience, and particularly with ease of contact and treatment, whilst burglary victims are most likely to feel satisfied with the actions taken. Victims of racist incidents are generally the least satisfied with all aspects, with the exception of follow up where they are the most satisfied. This perhaps relates to the enhanced follow up that victims of this crime type receive from Minority Liaison Officers.
- 3.36 The Force are pulling together a Victim Satisfaction Working Group to drive up victim satisfaction. Input is also being sought from the Teesside Strategic Victims Group.
