Executive Summary:				
The Youth Offending Team (YOT) Triage model brings YOT expertise and assessment processes to assist the Police with decision making at the earliest stage. Triage takes place at the point that a young person comes to the attention of the Police and acts as a 'gateway' whereby all young people can be rapidly assessed to ensure that they are dealt with swiftly and effectively. YOS assessments are unique in that information from across its networks is sourced, considered and validated, drawing from a range of sources including police, social care, health, housing, education, anti-social behaviour and substance misuse. Key information can be shared between the YOS and Police to ensure that decisions are made to reflect the needs of the victim, protect victims and communities from further harm and respond to the assessed needs of the young person. Bespoke intervention packages are tailored to meet the needs of the young people, to challenge the offending behaviour and where needed, other support services can be accessed.

Youth Offending Teams (YOTs) deliver statutory criminal justice services, we are charged with preventing and reducing youth crime. We are multi-agency in nature and function, bridging criminal justice, community safety and children's services. We have 3 key objectives:

- Reduce the rate of First Time Entrants to the youth justice system
- Reduce reoffending rates
- Reduce the use of custody

There are 3 YOTs within Cleveland. There is a strong history of collaboration between the Cleveland YOTs, as well as the flexibility to respond individually to local issues.

The Youth Justice Board has worked with YOTs to develop a wide range of evidence-based youth-crime prevention programmes, alongside national and local partners such as the Association of Chief Police Officers (ACPO), local authorities, charities and the voluntary sector.

YOTs are credible organisations, with established, proven assessment and intervention processes. National oversight and scrutiny comes from the Ministry of Justice & Youth Justice Board and YOTS are subject to inspectorates, including HMI Probation and HMI Constabulary. Local services in Cleveland have received highly positive feedback from inspectorate.

It is acknowledged nationally that the multi-agency nature of YOS is a significant factor in our success. Having a range of professionals and resources within the service ensures easier access to services for young people, improved information sharing and avoids duplication.

In order to deliver effective youth justice outcomes, the YOS engages with a range of agencies across the criminal justice, community safety and children's social care, education, prevention and early intervention services and health services and commissions services where this is a more effective and value for money.

Youth Offending Services are a statutory partner within community safety partnerships, criminal justice boards, multi-agency public protection arrangements and local safeguarding children's boards.

• The Triage model brings YOT expertise and assessment processes to assist the Police with decision making at the earliest stage. Triage takes place at the point that a young person comes to the attention of the Police and acts as a 'gateway' whereby all young people can be rapidly assessed to ensure that they are dealt with swiftly and effectively. YOS assessments are unique in that information from across its networks is sourced, considered and validated, drawing from a range of sources including police, social care, health, housing, education, anti-social behaviour and substance misuse. Key information can be shared between the YOS and Police to ensure that decisions are made to reflect the needs of the victim, protect victims and communities from further harm and respond to the assessed needs of the young person. Bespoke intervention packages are tailored to meet the needs of the young people, to challenge the offending behaviour and where needed, other support services can be accessed.

Issues of non-compliance or lack of engagement can be swiftly addressed and the young person can be referred back to the Police for consideration of further action.

Those young people who agree to engage with triage will not be prosecuted for their offending, with no further police action taken against them. They are however required to complete the requirements detailed in the intervention plan.

Triage is proven model for preventing or delaying further offending by young people and this demonstrated by the significant reduction in FTEs since its introduction in August 2013 and re-offending rates for young people subject to Triage.

Enhanced Out of Court Disposals. The YOTs will deliver enhanced intervention
packages to those young people, jointly assessed with the Police, as being suitable
for Out of Court Disposals, including the greater use of victim led and community
led restorative justice programmes.

YOTs are the pioneers of restorative justice services in Cleveland. Restorative justice processes empower victims and holds offenders to account for what they've done. It presents an opportunity to repair harm. Bespoke support packages are tailored to meet the needs of the young people and

where needed, other support services can be accessed.

Our proposals benefit a range of stakeholders, including victims and the broader community, as well as young people who offend and their families.

There are also cost savings to local partners; evidence is well established of the cost benefits to criminal justice agencies derived from diverting young people away from the criminal justice system.

The principal activities offered by Triage are:

- Casework approach to all young people
- Assessment of young people to ensure that criminogenic factors and needs of the young person are identified
- Engaging the young person in a programme of reparative and rehabilitative interventions to address assessed needs and those factors contributing to their offending. Intervention programmes will include:
 - Restorative activity focused on the needs of the victims and communities with reparation to repair any harm caused and protect victims and communities from further harm
 - Offending behaviour
 - Diversion and constructive activities
- Facilitating referrals to other support services, substance misuse services, education and training, CAMHS, health, family support or housing support services to assist them in meeting any needs identified

Will this application support or enhance other services that you intend to commission? (in no more than 300 words)

YOTs deliver a range of statutory services to young people, families and to victims.

Our proposal complements and enhances the delivery of services to courts and the police, by ensuring that young people who have come to the attention of the Police, and their families, are able to access coordinated youth justice services at a far earlier stage than would otherwise be possible to divert the young person from further offending.

Enhanced packages of support, which include assessment, intervention and support in accessing other agency support, as relevant.

Our proposals also offer more victims access to restorative justice services delivered by trained and accredited professionals.

YOTs deliver a range of services to young people, families and to victims. We receive funding from the Youth Justice Board and local partners to achieve national service requirements. Currently our structures and resources are sufficient to enable each YOT / YOS to deliver the statutory youth justice requirements.

Our proposals are to deliver non-statutory services and thus can be scaled down if required to reflect the level of grant funding required.

The objectives of Triage and Enhanced Out of Court Disposals are aligned with the key priorities and objectives in the Police & Crime Plan 2013-16:

- Diverting young people away from crime
- Ensuring that the needs of young people *and* their families are assessed and identified quickly and at an earlier stage and that appropriate interventions are put into place
- Increase the use of restorative processes to challenge the young person and make them take responsibility for their actions and promote confidence in the justice system among victims, witnesses and the wider community
- Improve collaboration and joint decision making between all services involved in the criminal justice system
- Reducing police time spent on processing paperwork
- Reducing levels of youth crime, reducing first time entrants and levels of reoffending;
 avoiding the unnecessary criminalisation of young people on the fringes of criminal activity
- Ensures that formal criminal justice processes are focused on the relatively serious offences and offenders, and can thus resolve these cases more quickly and effectively

Triage is proven model for preventing or delaying further offending by young people and this demonstrated by the significant reduction in FTEs since its introduction in August 2013 and reoffending rates for young people subject to Triage.

Out of Court Disposals:

The national framework for Out of Court Disposals was introduced early 2013, to deal with low impact offences out of the court system. Working protocols have been established between the Police and YOTs on joint decision making and the delivery of short focused intervention programmes. YOTs will be able to enhance intervention packages in this area, including greater use of restorative justice.

YOTs have well established communication strategies and are intrinsically aligned with the respective local authority media and communication strategies.

YOTs are also represented in a number of strategic plans at a local and sub-regional level, including Youth Justice Plans.

Each YOT operates as a local multi-agency partnership under a management board that holds statutory representation from the local authorities, Police, National Probation Service, Community Rehabilitation Company, Clinical Commissioning Group, as well as board membership from crime & disorder partnerships, local children's services, courts and voluntary and third sector organisations. This, alongside YOT representation on key partnership bodies, ensures robust communication with key stakeholders within criminal justice, health and social care and the third sector.
