Brief Description of Product

PCCs have a statutory duty to consult and engage with local communities to help ascertain and deliver their policing priorities. It is imperative that all communities have a clear voice in this engagement process, including young people who may be missed through traditional engagement mechanisms.

The PCC is seeking to directly commission an organisation to recruit and manage a dedicated Cleveland Youth Independent Advisory Group (IAG) to represent the voice of young people in Cleveland.

The commissioned service will be required to recruit between 20 and 25 young people between the ages of 14 and 25 to be members of the Youth IAG. Recruitment should cover a broad range of young people including representation from:

- All four geographic Local Authority areas that make up Cleveland
- All protected characteristics
- A broad range of lived experience including looked after children and young people with experience of the criminal justice system

The Youth IAG will establish a sustainable, structured system for young people aged 14-25 to influence decisions about policing and crime in Cleveland. The project will represent the views of young people across Cleveland to the PCC to support the development and delivery of the Police and Crime Plan.

The Youth IAG will work in partnership with the PCC, the OPCC and Cleveland Police, to inform, support and shape the key priorities of both organisations

The Lammy Review highlighted the disproportionate number of ethnically diverse community members within the criminal justice system. Particular concerns were raised regarding the Youth Justice System with the proportion of ethnically diverse offenders increasing during the period reviewed against a backdrop of decreasing numbers of white young people becoming involved in youth justice. The Police and Crime Plan sets out 10 strategic objectives that the Police and Crime Commissioner intends to focus on during his period of office, one of these being 'Building confidence in our communities' through being 'visible and accessible to all communities so I can hear and understand your concerns and priorities for the area.

Public consultation was undertaken as part of the development of the plan. As part of this consultation public feedback was obtained as to what is needed to take forward the priority areas. The importance of early intervention was highlighted by the consultation, with respondents feeling that more focus was needed on educating young people and diverting them from negative behaviour. By using a peer engagement model the Youth IAG will contribute towards this work.

Consu Itation



The OPCC previously commissioned Leaders Unlocked to establish a Cleveland Youth Commission to engage with young people between the ages of 14 and 25 in relation to their community safety priorities. The final report produced by the 2021/22 project highlighted the positive impact of this structured engage model on the young people involved in the project. A number of key recommendations were also developed involving continued peer to peer engagement with young people.

The key focus of the project is on recruiting 14 to 25 year olds to work with the OPCC and Police in developing community safety priorities and then to use a peer engagement model to ensure that a wider cross section of the young population in Cleveland are engaged in developing these priorities. This will give young people a voice in developing community safety priorities and services.
