

HOW CLEVELAND POLICE'S BUDGET IS SPENT

Here's how Cleveland Police invest every £1 of funding the Police and Crime Commissioner provides them:



ON A TYPICAL DAY AT CLEVELAND POLICE

- 581 incidents are recorded
- 182 crimes are recorded
- 13 missing persons reports, 11 of which will be classified as medium risk
- 70 violent crimes, 6 sexual offences, 2 robberies, 8 burglaries and 8 vehicle crimes
- 253 (999) calls are received
- 74 antisocial behaviour incidents
- 14 cyber enabled crimes
- 17 incidents flagged as being associated with people with mental health issues
- Officers make 44 arrests

INVESTING IN CLEVELAND POLICE

Through additional Government funding and an 80p per month increase to your council tax bill, Cleveland Police will receive **an additional £6.8m** over the next financial year. This is helping to pay for:



Highest number of officers since 2014 - by March 2023, Cleveland Police will have 250 more officers than in 2019 - an increase of 20%.



Increase in police officer pay - ensuring Cleveland Police's hardworking police officers receive fair pay for their work.

In total, PCC Steve Turner will invest **almost half a BILLION pounds** in Cleveland Police over the next three years, giving new Chief Constable Mark Webster an opportunity to drive forward improvement.
