WHAT Youth Endowment Fund - Themed Project Round

WHO from Home Office via the Youth Endowment Fund

WHO for registered charities, companies, statutory bodies and community interest

companies (CICs) supporting support children and young people in England

and/or Wales

WHEN Ends on 24 May 2024

**WORTH** Discretionary

WHERE England and Wales

WHY To provide a focus for the knowledge it wants to build about what interventions will

work to help create the conditions to keep child and young people safe and prevent them from being drawn into violence. The current grant round - Psychological Therapies - focuses on supporting projects that deliver talking therapies to children and young people who are at risk of becoming involved in crime and violence (known as secondary prevention) or those already involved in

the youth justice system (known as tertiary prevention).

HARVEY HINT Forces with projects to divert young people from violence and create

intervention tactics to steer away from long term involvement and harm. Liaise with offender management units, violent crime commands, community

safety units regarding partnership work they are doing

use to engage with communities and engage with young people. This fund could assist with expanding the clubs to increase the number of members or

improve facilities to achieve the same.

WHY The main aim of the Small Grants Programme is to improve road safety at a local

level. The funding is for smaller, local projects with a practical focus. The funder is looking for measurable interventions that link to local priorities and show a proposed

link to reducing casualties either directly or through clear interim measures.

Eligible projects are pilots/trials, expanding successful trials across a new area, and/or the evaluation of interventions. Projects should have the potential for being brought to scale, with the ultimate goal of reducing deaths and injuries both locally

and across the UK.

HARVEY HINT Roads policing officers and neighbourhood officers that engage with

community speed watch groups will have numerous ideas for activities that would be successful in preventing deaths & injuries if funded – liaise with them.

GrantFinder is the leading funding database in the UK covering local, national, and international sources of funding. It offers a user-friendly, time-saving platform which has enabled clients to secure millions of pounds' worth of support.

The platforms tools enable users to:

- Utilise comprehensive search facilities
- Refine results with text criteria or filters
- Produce a report
- Refine your updates news articles
- Save the search and enable alerts
- Share or save a fund

BlueLight Commercial has negotiated sub-licence to its own licence for all UK police forces to enable any force to have their own independent access. The benefit would be for forces to tailor searches for funds specifically for their local objectives, local force activities, projects with local partners and stakeholders. It is important to note that each licence allows for any number of users within each force.

This would allow local officers, project managers, commercial and finance specialists all to search and manage funds based on their own activities. BlueLight Commercial can assist forces in creating local policies and guidelines to enable multiple users adhere to the local scheme of consent and delegation.

The BLC sub-licence fees are:

- £3,750 for a 1-year contract term (reduced to £3,450 if more than 20 forces take out sub-licences)
- £3,562, for a 2-year contract term (reduced to £3,277 if more than 20 forces take out sub-licences)
- £3,375, for a 3-year contract term (reduced to £3,105 if more than 20 forces take out sub-licences)

It important for readers of this newsletter to be aware of local policies and procedures to follow when considering bids for grant funding.

The primary legal powers to accept funds will lie with the Police & Crime Commissioner or Deputy Mayor and their Office and force finance and commercial departments will have specialists who manage the bidding, application, contracting, monitoring and reporting processes.
