Activities (Components of Intervention – What Do You Plan to Do?)

- 1. Evolving GCSC programme monthly meetings
- 2. Identify young people/case studies who will be targeted for intervention, map the risk and identify what support they need, discuss with them the intervention
- 3. Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ) with young people included in intervention (bespoke Hemlington SDQ)
- 4. Community consultation and scrutiny group (c.6 adults & c.6 children)
- 5. Training delivered to champions/navigators
- 6. Strategic steering group comprising key professionals
- 7. Hemlington Compact securing commitment from all involved parties
- 8. The Creation of a Directory of Local Services and referral pathways
- 9. Familial signposting to support services
- 10. School Voice questionnaire facilitated by young people panel

Output (Immediate Results Linked to Activities – How Will Delivery be Measured?)

- 1. Revised and improved SAYVE plan co-creation and regular review with evolving GCSC programme & steering group

Outcomes (Indirect or Intermediate Effects – Any Measurable Effect from Activities?)

- 1. Enhanced multi-agency collaboration and accountability to drive effective change
- 2. Increased referrals between partners through effective joined up working
- 3. Young people and wider community feel empowered to have a voice and share feedback, leading to the co-creation of service delivery community feel like stakeholders, feel included and take pride in involvement
- 4. Improved life chances among young people, families and carers through increased access to ETE support, stabilising the family unit and home environment
- 5. Reduction in anti-social behaviour and serious violence across Hemlington through increased opportunities for early intervention and increased opportunities for young people
